

Introduction

This guide is predominantly written by young parents, for young parents and seeks to highlight organizations and resources that the group felt was most responsive, youth friendly, non-stigmatizing and helpful based on phone calls and conversations interns had when researching and calling organizations.

Parenting During the Pandemic X3 Virtual Internship for Young Parents:

Future Focused Education's X3 paid internship program convened a cohort of young parents from Albuquerque, Rio Rancho, Cuba and Santa Fe in the Fall of 2020 and Spring of 2021, to grow their virtual professional work-based skills while identifying and addressing needed support for young parents state-wide. In addition to learning how to adapt professional skills to the virtual environment, they were also offered elements of peer support training for other young parents by researching and vetting available activities, resources and organizations that offer support to young parents, especially during the pandemic. In partnership with Rio Rancho GRADS teacher Amy Guzie, interns were able to learn directly from a variety of professional providers in the fields of mental and behavioral health, child development, and the healthcare field during weekly guest speaker sessions. Through examining their own lived experiences, hearing the experiences of others and learning from professionals, interns developed this Parenting During the Pandemic Resource, a culmination of their collaborative work and their identified work-based deliverable.



How to use this guide:

This guide is structured with Maslow's Hierarchy of Need in mind. Resources related to basic needs and safety are found toward the beginning of the guide, to better cater to young parents (or providers) with acute needs or a crisis response for support, while resources related to education and career pathways will be found towards the end of the guide. Additionally, a call script was developed to support young parents (and professionals) when calling organizations so that they can get the best information possible so they can best determine if that organization or resources is a good fit for them, their situation and their families.

We want to acknowledge that Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs was taken from the cultural and traditional practices of Blackfoot Nation.

Support when Calling Resources:

X3 Interns quickly named numerous barriers related to their attempts at calling, engaging and seeking help from organizations. These barriers included a lack of knowledge about where and how to search for resources, anxiety related to contacting organizations (especially by phone), poor customer services that left young parents feeling overwhelmed, frustrated and (at worst) hopeless, to name a few. In partnership with the mentors and facilitators of the group, as well as a seasoned and experienced professional social worker and case manager, the group came up with a call script that they used as support when calling resources to ensure that they obtained the most helpful and important information to determine eligibility and best fit for themselves and their families. The following is a modified version the call script, which can be used by young parents and professionals alike:

Hello, my name is ______ and I am a [student/ parent/professional from_____]. I am looking for resources that can support young parents and I was wondering if I could ask you some questions about your organization?

- Can you please tell me more about what resources/supports you offer and any that may be particularly helpful for young parents?
- Where are you located and what areas of the state do you provide services for?
- What are your hours of operation? Do you have a number that people can call after hours?
- What makes someone eligible to participate/receive services from your organization?
- Are there age requirements?
- Do you charge for your services? Do you have any income requirements?
- If someone doesn't have insurance, what help can they be given?
- If under 18, would a young person need parent/guardian consent? Do your staff know about the Children's Code, which outlines young people's right to receive certain services without parental/guardian consent?
- Do I need to show ID or social security number?
- Do you have services/paperwork available in different languages other than English? If so, what languages do you offer?
- What COVID safe practices are you using during this time?





Who can I talk to at shcool or at the school I recently graduated from?

You could speak to the administration office in a HS, a guidance counselor. They can also help with FAFSA and financial aid applications. They can also help you apply for scholarships.

At CNM - Academic Coaches can help with course planning, degree evaluations, program/career guidance, transferring, graduation, community resource guidance. You can talk to them via email, online chat, phone, or video chat as well as in person.

Cares Act - Little SunCats offers childcare support. This program offers support to single mothers at CNM.

What is the difference between University, Community College, Trade School, and Certificate Programs.

Community colleges provide certification programs and trade schools. Also they provide two-year degrees. Those degrees are called associates degrees. The university offers a four year degree and what's known as a bachelor's degree. A bachelor's degree is a degree given by a four-year college program. Universities can also go on to offer you a masters or doctorate certification. Those additional degrees and certifications can be required for different careers. For example, if you wanted to be a doctor of medical science you need a bachelors, a masters, and a doctorate. Those are all separate degrees and put together they take a minimum of 10 to 12 years
