Tip Sheet: Family Self-Sufficiency

Things to consider

- What does the conversation look like when you talk with a family about family goals that support family self-sufficiency?
- What support do you provide families to help them meet their goals?
- How do you support families when they need employment, education, and/or childcare?
- What resources do you have in your community to support families with employment, education, and/or childcare?
- What are the barriers families experience when pursuing employment, education, and/or childcare?

Important Tips

- Be mindful of the importance to validate the family's/caregivers' feelings and wishes when you have conversations with them about family self-sufficiency.
- Remember to practice the Facilitating Attuned Interactions and Motivational Interviewing approaches while you develop goals with families.
- Before you meet with a family, think about questions that will help guide your discussion about family self-sufficiency.
