Our Funding

- The Bernalillo County Home Visiting Work Group was one of three awarded Systems Building Grants by the State of New Mexico ECECD. The other two recipients from Bernalillo County were Cuidando los Ninos and Explora.
- Most attention is focused on center-based services for young children. The ECECD systems building grants are to highlight and draw attention/awareness to the array of home-based services as an alternative or dual enrollment opportunity for families. Home visitation focuses on bonding, attachment, and relationships between the child and parents or caregivers.

Coalition Summary



"When a Baby is born, so is a Mother, Parents or Caregiver."

- Bernalillo County Home Visiting Workgroup was founded in **2010** as a county-wide partnership of home visiting providers who shared a deep-seated belief that children and families thrive at home with support from quality home visitation programs.
- Not all families are ready or need center-based education and care, and home visitation provides that option for families who can stay at home during these important formation years of attachment and bonding.
- BCHVWG recognized from the start that coordination is necessary for **prevention** services; such as child abuse/neglect, behavior, drugs, postpartum, food insecurities, etc.
- In our monthly meetings, BCHVWG continues to work to bring program leaders, parents, and the community, together to **build relationships and trust in the community with the common goal of improving child outcomes in New Mexico**.
- As a group, together the **BCHVWG has succeeded in creating a mutual and respectful** network of leaders who provide home visiting services through coordination, education, professional development, and problem-solving regarding the early childhood home visiting system.
- The **coalition works together to provide resources, staff development, presenters, and more importantly a platform to share experiences, and resources and ask questions**.
- BCHVWG emphasizes the accomplishments of building collaboration, relationships, and the importance of raising awareness around home visitation in the community.
- **Our coalition is very focused on communication:** we send out weekly Community Events email to 275 partners. Our newsletter includes staff development and employment opportunities for Early Childhood and Home Visiting, activities, events and opportunities for our partners to share with their parents and staff.

BCHVWG Coalition Meeting Shared Sessions

Topics discussed during our open forum at our BCHVWG Coalition Meeting

At our monthly Zoom Meeting we had an open forum with all members of our BCHVWG Coalition. As a group, we discussed their concerns that they would like the coalition to address. Some of the comments, concerns, and topics shared from our BCHVWG Coalition Partners:

- Bringing families to the table to participate and find out their needs
- Breakout sessions available in different language, including sign language
- Breaking silos within home visiting
- Revisit the common referral system for home visiting and improve the process. Some families are in two or three lists waiting lists. Some families are getting two or three organizations that visit them, and other families are not getting home visiting at all. Need continuity with same home visitor.
- Assigning an ID Number to each family referral and child.
- The need for coordination and alignment across programs at every level was often raised. The desire from stakeholders is to truly integrate Bernalillo County Home Visiting referral system. This includes alignment with health systems, and Early Childhood Home Visiting a continuum for support for children and families. This would include the sovereign nations who move to BC or vice versa. This would ensure children do not fall through the cracks. A way to transfer HV as well. Some programs have a waiting list and some have many openings.
- Widespread awareness of who qualifies for which program. Eligible criteria with an algorithm in a database. Availability to show who qualified for which program. Share routinely with hospitals, caseworkers, home visitors, social workers, prenatal clinics, Physicians, etc. Creating a network.
- Create an objective with a mission and vision statement as a group for the coalition.
- Connect resources in the community to build referral pathways
- Connect families to resources and resources to families

- Families are connected to formal and informal support in their community

Key Goals

- To be proactive through promotion, prevention, and treatment by increasing parent and caregiver awareness of all early childhood services.
- Families – Recognize all families in New Mexico as key decision-makers. To have the frontline workers bring the voices of the families to the table.
- Governance – Strengthen ongoing government-to-government relationships with tribal communities to foster mutual trust and understanding, and partnerships that respect tribal sovereignty.
- Workforce – Devise strategies to make things easier for providers and families by ensuring New Mexico's early childhood workforce is supported to meet the needs of all families and young children through an aligned professional development system.
- Develop a statewide, integrated data system to better inform planning and decision-making.

- We value making relationships, building and nurturing trust, and maintaining authenticity, as we dedicate ourselves to the same cause by educating ourselves, sharing resources, and connecting networks.



- We serve pregnancy to early childhood and young families, grandparents raising grandchildren, grandchildren, and teach self-care for parents, teachers, and caregivers



- We continue to learn about each other and make referrals across agencies, addressing barriers and obstacles by meeting monthly to network, coordinate, integrate, plan and participate in professional development training. This is a chance to speak out about their programs and provide announcements.



Learning Opportunities

- To create more cohesive, equitable, and effective early childhood systems in New Mexico, which will require coordinating a continuum of family-driven, community-based high-quality prenatal to five programs and services that are available and accessible to all families in every corner of the state.
- To strengthen partnerships at the state and local levels to effectively use all available resources across the mixed-delivery system
- Seek to heal trauma, including historical and generational trauma, and deconstruct systemic racism, sexism, and other entrenched and unfair biases.
- Learn about each other and make referrals across agencies, addressing barriers and obstacles by meeting monthly to network coordinate, integrate, plan and participate in professional development.

Community Needs Assessment

September 30, 2022

Purpose and Methodology of our Community Needs Assessment

- BCHVWG leaders reviewed currently available demographic, health, social, economic, and educational data; and combined this information with input from the community through a family dialogue session to provide a comprehensive overview of early childhood needs.
- The methodology used to create this Community Needs Assessment (CNA) was to concentrate on Bernalillo County in comparison to the State of New Mexico and view the home visiting availability for Bernalillo County. Also, to analyze the problems our community faces and how they can have an effect on our children.
- To answer these questions, our coalition wanted to hear from our families and our community throughout the Bernalillo County Area. The Coalition created a diverse family dialogue session to have our families and community voice concerns.
- Below are key questions asked as part of the CNA to determine if children are receiving the proper resources and needs in home visiting.
 - Is there a need to concentrate and target specific demographic areas?
 - How many children received home visits in comparison to how many were retaining the resources?
 - Is there equity in home visiting?
 - Why should home visiting be a priority for children under the age of 5?
 - Review specific indicators of concern: Demographic Area, Social and Cultural, Poverty, Language Barriers, Health Care, Secure Employment, Economic Stability, and Safety



Recommendations: Concentrate on our Key Findings

- *Demographic, Health, and Economic Indicators*
- *Poverty Indicators*
- *Language Barriers Indicators*
- *Secure Employment and Economic Stability Indicators*
- *Safety Indicators*
- *Prevent Death Indicators*

- BCHVWG partners recognize that home visiting is the foundational referral source to the continuum of early childhood services.
- Home visitors have the opportunity to work with families before babies are born and support families to start thinking about education, development, building a bond with babies, health, and safety.
- Home visiting is the connector for families with childcare, early childhood education, and early intervention as well as community-based resources, providing educational support in many ways.
- BCHVWG wants to continue to promote home visiting as a collective and coordinated effort, working together to promote awareness about services, and contributing to state goals for an integrated system of support for all families based on their commitment to work in partnership with ECECD, the community and with each other.



Our Findings During our Dialogue Session

During the Dialogue Session the items of concern were:

- I want my kids to graduate, she's 18 and I think she may not graduate
- To be successful when she grows up
- To have better life than mine
- The ability to make better choices than I did at that age
- Be happy
- Children feel safe
- Discipline, values, responsible, taking care of self, confidence, understanding, everyone has different situations
- Access to swimming sports, activities, recreation, culturally
- Nutrition – food security and quality food
- Quality time with family
- Have food from their cultural at school – have a variety
- Safety in the neighborhood and parks
- Less violence, less drugs, less needles, less crime
- Lack of respect: litter, graffiti
- Use parks for what they are for, no homeless and keep safe

- Making a connection with neighbors: verbal, waving, smiling saying hello, showing kindness
- Home Visiting is a great resource, emotional support: getting comfortable with home visiting, explain there is no associate with CYFD

- Invite parents and the community to have a voice at our table.
- BCHVWG has committed to create an outreach and partner with ALL Home Visiting Programs, the community, physicians, NM Health Department, working with other New Mexico coalitions, and most important working hand-in-hand with ECECD. To create a profound awareness of how this coalition and our home visitors can have a huge impact on our Albuquerque and New Mexico Communities. This will lower the risks and negative outcomes of so many issues currently plaguing ABQ.
- Bernalillo County is funded 744 Home Visitation slots.

*What would New Mexico look like if every family and every child had a home visitor?
Currently in Bernalillo County, we have approximately 34,394 children under the age of 5
and only 744 that are currently being serviced by a home visitor.*





The Tiny Home Village is a transitional housing program designed to build community and help residents achieve their goals toward more permanent housing. Space at the THV is limited so, if it is decided by the applicant and the Village that we're a good fit, they may be added to a waitlist.

WHAT IS THE VILLAGE LIKE?

The Tiny Home Village is a community living space. Villagers live either alone or as a couple in one of 30 tiny homes. The homes are 120 sq. ft. and each has heating and cooling, a bed, shelving, and a desk. Villagers have access to communal bathrooms, a kitchen, and indoor/outdoor living space. Additionally, there is a community garden and dog park.

The Village is designed to encourage community living. All of the houses face the common spaces. Staff encourage organic and organized activities. While living at the Village, Villagers work with a case management team to set and achieve goals. Case Managers will help them identify resources and continue on their path to long-term housing and self-determination.



WHO WILL QUALIFY TO LIVE AT THE TINY HOME VILLAGE?

- An individual or couple (if applying to live in a unit as a couple each person must fill out an individual application)
- Able to live independently – prepare own meals, clean up after oneself, complete village chores.


